# GREAT ARTS AND CULTURE MAKES A GREAT FUTURE

Great neighbourhoods, the ones that thoughtfully consider people and place, incorporating mixed-uses, walkable spaces, and abundant amenities, are one of the best urban design concepts humans have come up with to support the complex, interrelated needs of a diverse economy and a vibrant culture. When these great neighbourhoods are networked together and located in close relationships with industrial landscapes, the stage is set for society to reap supercharged benefits. At the scale of East Calgary's Ward 9, our communities have shaped, and are actively reshaping the character and destiny of our city.

For several decades in North America, arts and culture has been separated from and set against our understanding of 'economy.' A strong economy was something we needed; a vibrant arts and culture scene was, at best, a nice-to-have, and, at worst, an unserious distraction or partisan misadventure. Luckily, these notions have been challenged and debunked by a growing body of academic research and practical case studies - a consensus has formed that now appreciates how a strong and diversified economy and a vibrant arts and culture sector are inextricable from one another.

In Calgary, the question as to whether arts and culture has a role to play in our long-term success has largely been settled: two successive City Councils (with widely divergent political ideologies and agendas) have overwhelmingly supported increased financial backing for our arts and culture sector as an integral part of diversifying our economy. As cities continue to compete against each other on the world stage, they are also laying the groundwork for success (or failure) long into an uncertain future. The ones that will be successful over the long term are the ones actively and deliberately building up their arts and culture sectors today.

Unfortunately, global unease and political discontent has provoked a backlash by those nostalgic for what Calgary once was, or angry with the pace of change. But Calgary's socio-cultural diversity is prevailing. Driven by decades of newcomers choosing our city as a place to establish roots, Calgary is challenging outdated ideas about who we are, and rapidly becoming a beacon of the Canadian project of pluralism.

Our arts and culture sector must take center stage in both accounting for and celebrating who we are - in all our diversity. Creating the stories whereby we will live and thrive together, and, discovering how we best become something greater than the sum of our parts. In acknowledgment and pursuit of these ideals, this map pays tribute to the City of Calgary's flagship work on arts and culture: The Eventful City Strategy. Public art, landmarks, events, and venues - the obvious things that make neighbourhoods vibrant and culturally rich in Calgary - act as an indicator of the state of arts and culture in our city. Like our other Ward 9 maps, this map presents an inevitably incomplete snapshot in time, intended to compile and celebrate what we have, provoke conversations about the gaps we can't help but notice, and act as an origin-point for plans to fill those gaps. By continually investing in and improving our amazingly diverse East Calgary communities, we are setting our beloved Calgary up for long term success.



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## CIVIC COMMITMENTS TO ARTS + CULTURE

Festivals, events, arts, and culture all help to grow our city and connect communities in meaningful ways. These are some of the policies and programs that ensure Calgary, and Ward 9, continue to be a leader in arts and culture.

**Eventful City Strategy** - Calgary recognizes that festivals and events enhance quality of life, provide opportunities for celebration and connection, and are essential elements in creating complete communities. The Eventful City Strategy helps us proactively shape the future of the creative sector.

**Winter City Strategy** - The Winter City Strategy leverages our unique northern climate to make Calgary a more prosperous, vibrant, and welcoming place through year-round programming.

**Public Art Program + Collection** - With a growing collection of over 1,300 works, the City's public art program is committed to enhancing our urban landscape and transforming the way Calgarians experience the city around them.

**Local Area Planning (LAP)** - The process of creating a Local Area Plan allows community members to co-create an overarching vision to guide the evolution and redevelopment of the area, with cultural planning being an increasingly integral part of that process.

**Municipal Event + Landmark Special Policy Areas** - In an effort to better balance the influx of visitors to local landmarks with the needs and enjoyment of local residents, the Landmark Special Policy Area addresses issues related to urban design, parking, social disorder, and street access that often impact adjacent communities.

**Calgary Arts Development Authority (CADA)** - Through municipal investment, CADA serves as Calgary's designated arts development authority, supporting hundreds of local arts organizations, artists, collectives, and the commissioning of new public art projects.

## FUTURE CIVIC COMMITMENTS TO ARTS + CULTURE

**Film-Friendly Policy** - While Calgary already offers significant supports to the film and television industry, further formalizing policy and strategy to attract more production and eliminate red tape is a positive step to diversifying our economy.

**Maker Neighbourhoods** - The new land use bylaw will establish areas where the implementation of creative live-work spaces, makerspaces, and light-industrial mixed with residential is allowed.

**Culture + Entertainment District** - Nestled in Calgary's resurging downtown eastside, the C+E District is home to the Calgary Stampede, and will soon offer an expanded Convention Centre, and a new event centre, supporting residential, office, and commercial development.

**Meanwhile Leases** - Working to connect real estate vacancies with interim tenants active in the creative economy. By leveraging links in vacancies and development, local groups can access short-term tenancy in otherwise underutilized spaces. The City of Calgary also has a policy to lease city-owned buildings intended for future demolition to applicable non-profit arts, culture, social, or recreation organizations, at below market rates.

**Makerspaces** - A communal space that offers shared tools and supplies to allow people to enter with an idea and leave with a completed project.

**Creative Incubators** - Projects like CSpace (part arts hub/part innovative venue/part coworking space for creative Calgarians) and Platform (part parkade/part office space/part hub for Calgary's startup tech sector) seek to activate collaborative spaces in unique and innovative ways.

**Beltline Urban Murals Project (BUMP)** - Started in 2017, this community-led, artist-focused initiative has exploded to become a city-wide street art festival reimagining public spaces through the visual arts. Since its beginnings, over 100 murals have been created.

**Preserving Venue Spaces** - Calgary is home to many beautiful and unique venues. Creating policy and incentives to safeguard the long-term preservation of these spaces will ensure all Calgarians will continue to have access to the arts.

**Dedicated Arts + Culture Funding** - Calgary has made significant investments in arts and culture, but more is still needed. By increasing year-over-year dedicated funding allocations and benchmarking these allocations against other municipalities, Calgary can wholly commit to being a world-class leader in arts and culture.

## PUBLIC ART

Now a well-accepted principle of urban design, public art plays a vital role in the development of modern, vibrant cities. Here are just some of the beautiful art installations that share the unique and diverse story of Ward 9.

- 87. **Dance by V. Tokmalyan, L. Vera, J. Urria, J. Luc Germain, Z. Nguen, M. Loazia** - Unity Park, 17 Ave + 30 St SE  
Created by a multidisciplinary artist team, this artwork celebrates dance as a common form of social expression across all cultures.
- 88. **Dinny the Dinosaur, Calgary Zoo** - 210 St. George's Drive NE  
Built in 1957, 'Dinny' the Brontosaurus is the last remaining structure from the original Natural History Park at the Calgary Zoo. At 34 feet tall, and 107 feet long, Dinny serves as a symbolic reminder that extinction is forever.
- 89. **Fence Mural by Margo van Lindenberg** - 72 Ave SE + 21A St SE  
An ecological narrative of the flora and fauna of the area. Community residents offered input into the design and installation along the fence on 72nd Ave SE.
- 90. **Forest Lawn Lift Station by Sans Façon** - 19 Ave + 26 St SE  
Embedded in the surface of the station, a color-changing lighting system depicts a scaled map of the sanitary pipes and water flow levels of Forest Lawn, bringing light to hidden infrastructure and alerting the community to how water is used.
- 91. **Hippo Love by Fuse33 Makerspace** - 3710 17 Ave SE  
Originally built in 2012 for the Burning Man Festival, the 'Hippo Love' Art Car now calls International Ave home. The giant purple hippo head greets passersby, eliciting many smiles.
- 92. **Kaw's'omshkaiks, Animals that Roam the Prairies** by Adrian Stinson - 17 Ave + 33 St SE  
This installation pays homage to the animals that have inhabited the plains now known as Calgary and International Ave. Visitors are able to learn the names of the animals and the Siksiká (Blackfoot) pronunciations.
- 93. **Rainbow Trout by Jeff de Boer** - Enmax Park, Elbow River Pathway + MacDonald Ave SE  
As one of the most sought after catches by anglers along the Elbow River, this artwork serves to reflect the vibrant ecosystem and assert the importance of environmental protection of urban spaces.
- 94. **Vietnamese Boat People Monument by TB Tran** - Journey to Freedom Park, 1807 17 Ave SE  
A monument honouring the Vietnamese Boat People and those who tragically lost their lives on their journey to freedom in Canada after the fall of Saigon in 1975.
- 95. **Wishing Well by Living Lenses** - 939 McDougall Rd NE  
A community wishing well where your words become music and colours. Participants can text a wish to the sculpture then experience the message translated into light and sound.
- 96. **Wolfe and the Sparrows by Brandon Vickerd** - SW corner of 12 St SE Bridge  
Inspired by an existing statue of General James Wolfe, 'Wolfe and the Sparrows' seeks to transform the look of traditional monuments, offering new ways to reflect on what monuments say about our history.



## ANNUAL EVENTS + FESTIVALS

Ward 9 is home to many of the city's most unique events. Along with providing ample opportunities to experience arts and culture, they also contribute to the vibrancy for which Calgary is known. Here are just some of the annual events that make Ward 9 a great place to live, work, and play.

- 97. **Around the World Food Tours** - 17th Ave SE  
Calgary's first and best food tour, explore International Avenue and learn about the many restaurants, shops, and food markets from all over the world.
- 98. **Beakerhead** - TELUS Spark, 220 St. George's Dr NE + Various Locations  
Through year-round educational programs and an annual fall festival, Beakerhead is working to advance education at the crossroads of art, science, and engineering.
- 99. **Block Heater** - Festival Hall, 1215 10 Ave SE + Various Locations  
Calgary Folk Music Festival's annual winter ritual featuring a variety of artists at venues along the Music Mile and throughout downtown.
- 100. **Bridgeland Arctic Adventure** - Bridgeland Piazza, 177 9 St NE  
A family-friendly outdoor scavenger hunt. Embrace the winter season while adventuring in Bridgeland-Riverside.
- 101. **Calgary Expo** - Stampede Park, 650 25 Ave SE  
Comics, sci-fi, horror, anime, and gaming - Calgary Expo attracts hundreds of thousands of people to Calgary each year.
- 102. **Calgary Fringe Festival** - Various Locations  
An Inglewood and Ramsay-based uncensored, non-juried theatre festival, bringing together emerging and established artists to tell their stories on stage.
- 103. **Calgary Stampede + Elbow River Camp** - 1410 Olympic Way SE  
It's the greatest outdoor show on earth! The Stampede is an annual rodeo and exhibition held for 10 days in July. The Elbow River camp allows visitors to experience the traditions and culture of the Treaty 7 First Nations.
- 104. **Chasing Summer Music Festival** - Max Bell Centre, 1001 Barlow Tr SE  
The largest electronic dance music festival in Western Canada.
- 105. **Chinook Blast** - Various Locations  
Embracing Calgary's winter season, Chinook Blast offers six weeks of outdoor programming in art, music, theatre, sport, and recreation.
- 106. **Country Thunder Alberta** - Fort Calgary, 750 9th Ave SE  
North America's premier country music festival.
- 107. **East Calgary Studio Crawl** - Artpoint, 1038 17 Ave SE  
Visit various art studios in Ramsay and Inglewood to engage with artists working in diverse media, and participate in community art activities.
- 108. **East Town Get Down** - International Ave SE  
Taking place on a six-block length of 17th Ave SE, enjoy unique food and drink, intimate venues, and wide a range of local musical performers.
- 109. **Global Fest** - Elliston Park, 1827 68 St SE + Various Locations  
An annual celebration of Calgary's multi-cultural communities, featuring performances, international food, and world-class fireworks.
- 110. **Inglewood Sunfest + Car-Free Sundays** - 9th Ave SE  
Sunfest is modern day street fair that closes 9th Ave SE to vehicle traffic, reclaiming the space for pedestrians, local businesses, vendors, live music, and expanded patios. Car-Free Sundays (with various dates throughout the summer) expand on that idea.
- 111. **Inglewood Night Market** - 1107 10 Ave SE  
Bringing live music, local artisans, great food, and family fun to the nighttime streets of Inglewood on specific Fridays throughout the year.
- 112. **Jane's Walk Calgary** - Various Locations  
A global event of free neighbourhood walking tours held each May. Inspired by and in honour of urbanist and activist, Jane Jacobs.
- 113. **JazzyYC Summer Festival** - Music Mile, 9 Ave SE  
The JazzyYC Summer Festival features both ticketed and free events at various venues along Calgary's Music Mile.
- 114. **July 1st Canada Day** - Various Locations  
The anniversary of the Constitution Act which formalized Canada as a nation, many communities are reimagining Canada Day to instead honour and recognize Indigenous Peoples as we work toward a more meaningful commitment to Truth and Reconciliation.
- 115. **Orange Shirt Day** - Various Locations  
Also known as Canada's National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, Sept 30th serves to honour Survivors and intergenerational Survivors of the Indian residential school system, and to commemorate those who didn't return home.
- 116. **Sled Island Ramsay Block Party** - 126 Hurst Rd SE  
A free, family-friendly all-day live music event hosted in the heart of Ramsay.
- 117. **Stampede Pancake Breakfasts** - Various Locations  
A Calgary tradition for more than 85 years, there are hundreds of free pancake breakfasts happening during Stampede.

## COMMUNITY CENTRES, SCHOOLS + FAITH-BASED INSTITUTIONS

Often used as a central hub where neighbours can gather, community centres, schools, and faith-based institutions provide a space for athletic, civic, educational, political, religious, or social events to take place. Looking ahead, designing these spaces as fully integrated civic facilities that include multiple resources such as libraries, recreation spaces, emergency services, housing, or even for-profit ventures such as cafes, restaurants, or co-working spaces, will help support their long-term viability.

## LANDMARKS


Landmarks are areas, objects, or landscapes that can easily be seen and recognized, that mark or memorialize a significant turning point or cultural moment, or that enable someone to establish their location. Calgary is home to many iconic landmarks - here are just some that are important to Ward 9.

- 118. **Calgary Tower** - 101 9 Ave SW  
Originally named the Husky Tower, the Calgary Tower was built in 1968 to promote the downtown core as a part of a Calgary urban renewal program. Despite no longer being the tallest building in the city, it still plays a prominent role in Calgary's striking downtown skyline and can be seen from most vantage points throughout Ward 9.
- 119. **Central Library** - 800 3 St SE  
Just outside Ward 9, the Central Library serves as the flagship branch for the Calgary Library. The award-winning architecture has rightfully landed this location on a short list of notable buildings in the world.
- 120. **Confluence of the Bow + Elbow Rivers** - Fort Calgary, 750 9 Avenue SE  
In 1875, Calgary was founded by the North-West Mounted Police at the Fort where the Bow and Elbow rivers meet. More recent understanding is challenging that timeline as this location has been a meaningful gathering place for Indigenous Peoples since time immemorial.
- 121. **Scotiabank Saddledome** - 555 Saddledome Rise SE  
Since 1983, the Saddledome has been Calgary's gathering place for large-scale events as well as an iconic element of Calgary's distinct skyline. Most notably, it serves as home ice for the Calgary Flames.
- 122. **Scotsman's Hill** - Salisbury St SE  
Arguably the most iconic lookout point in the city, Scotsman's Hill offers a striking view of downtown Calgary, and a perfect vantage point for watching fireworks or getting a behind-the-scenes peek at the Stampede.
- 123. **Saint Dunstan's Memorial Site** - Close to what is now Deerfoot Tr + Glenmore Tr  
Saint Dunstan's Industrial School operated from 1892 to 1907. As one of the 94 Truth & Reconciliation calls-to-action in the White Goose Flying Report, the City of Calgary is working with Treaty 7 Nations to respectfully memorialize the site.
- 124. **Tom Campbell's Hill Interpretive Exhibit** - 25 St Georges Dr NE  
In addition to offering a beautiful view of the Calgary skyline, the park features an interpretive exhibit sharing information about the park's history and the unique rough rescue grassland ecosystem.




## DISTRICTS

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## ★ FUTURE ARTS + CULTURE SPACES

- 49. **Bishop Kidd School Site + Community Lands** - 1420 28 St SE  
Albert Park-Radisson Heights lost their Community Hall to structural failure in the mid-2010s. When Bishop Kidd School reaches its end-of-life cycle, these lands present an incredible redevelopment opportunity anchored in cultural uses that celebrate the community's diversity.
- 50. **Brewery Rail Land Arts Campus** - 17 Ave + 14A St SE  
Formerly a significant arts and culture hub in our city, the redevelopment of the Brewery Rail Lands site will ideally include an arts campus to support a keystone arts organization in Calgary.
- 51. **Calgary Event Centre** - At the junction of 12 Ave + 4 St SE  
Future home to the Calgary Flames and other professional sport teams, the new event centre will host global and local entertainment events.
- 52. **Community of Belvedere** - East of Stoney Tr + North of 17 Ave SE  
The East Calgary neighbourhoods of Belvedere are set to be built as transit-oriented complete communities that will include thoughtful mixed-use residential and commercial choice, next-generation schools and community halls, and integrated civic facilities.
- 53. **David D Doughton School Site** - 1511 34 St SE  
The City of Calgary has put these former school lands under the purview of the Calgary Municipal Land Corporation with the mandate to set the bar for redevelopment in Greater Forest Lawn in terms of quality, variety of housing choices, and celebration of the area's cultural diversity.
- 54. **Greater Forest Lawn Multi-Service Centre** - Between 14 Ave + 8 Ave SE and 47 St + 52 St SE  
30 years in the making, the GFL Multi-Service Centre will create a hub for art, culture, community, and recreation. Along with a fire station and library, the centre will also aim to provide a home for ethno-cultural groups in the area.
- 55. **Indigenous Gathering Place** - Potentially near the confluence of the Bow + Elbow Rivers  
A dedicated gathering place for all Nations and Indigenous peoples' to share ceremonial practices, and transfer language, knowledge, and culture to Indigenous youth.
- 56. **Millican Ogden Brownfield Site (MODS)** - Refinery Park - Ogden Rd + 50th Ave SE  
Through remediation and redevelopment of Refinery Park and served by the future GreenLine LRT, the Millican Ogden Brownfield Site is earmarked to become the city's largest outdoor festival space.
- 57. **Renfrew Athletic Park** - 814 13 Ave NE  
Envisioned primarily as a recreation facility, the future buildout of the Renfrew Athletic Park provides ample opportunity for supportive cultural uses.



## ★ ART GALLERIES

Galleries play a pivotal role in nurturing and incubating both emerging and established artists. In addition to providing space for artists to show and sell their work, they also help collect, preserve, study, and present arts and culture to the community.
